Montpelier Redevelopment Commission

The Montpelier Redevelopment Commission met at city hall on July 27. Bill Walters, introduced ECIRPD. Julie Thompson, BSN, RN, who is the Chief Administrative Officer and Chief Nursing Officer for Bluffton Regional Medical Center. Bluffton.

The center is part of the Lutheran Health Network. The two organizations will be staffing and coordinating the medical office that will open as soon as November in one section of Montpelier's former Chaney Hardware and Appliance buildings on South Main Street. Local residents may have noticed that the building has been under renovation for a couple of

months and one side is substantially complete, according to Montpelier Mayor Kathy Bantz.

Bluffton Regional plans to have a physician's assistant or a nurse practitioner and staff supervised by a doctor who will be in the office periodically. Visits will be by appointment only, city officials have said.

"We'll try to get you in as soon as possible," Walters told Thompson, adding that the commission had received a match grant to renovate the exterior and interior of the structure and had applied for more funds.

mayor The nounced that she also had requested \$100,000 from the Blackford County Economic Development Corporation to perform more work on 123 S. Main.

Thompson told the "We're commission, especially excited. with what's happened Blackford Countv with IU Health. We think it will be key to have someone here (in Montpelier.) We will be looking at and posting for a mid-level position, either a PA or a nurse practitioner because it's hard to find family practitioners. We just can't find them, so the PA or LPN will be under the supervision of a doctor, probably Dr. Williams, because he would be the closest, in Markle, and he's well established," Thompson commented.
